#### I. Call to Order and Introductions

Meeting called to order at 5:16 pm by Bryant Seton, Vice Chair. Introductions were made.

## II. Approval of March 2018

The March 2018 minutes were presented for approval.

Motion was made by Cunha to approve the March 2018 minutes as written. Ackermann seconded the motion, so approved by unanimous vote.

### III. New Business

Early Assessment Support Alliance (EASA) - Sara Kaye

This is a new program for Benton County, starting this year. EASA is an early intervention for youth who might be experiencing psychosis for the first time; psychosis that is related to mental health. It's estimated that 1 in 30 youth experience some sort of psychosis, can be related to a variety of medical conditions. Partnership with the schools, including Oregon State University, mental health providers, etc. Things to look for in youth are reduced performance, behavior changes, and perceptual changes. After a referral is received, an assessment is completed for the youth and a comprehensive coordinated team model is put in place to help support the youth. The program is set up for 10-12 youth being served in the first year, currently Benton County program has 5 enrolled youth. Handout was provided.

Eligibility requirements for the program are:

- 12 25 years old
- Lives in Benton County
- Currently not receiving services from developmental diversity programs
- No more than 12 months since diagnosed with psychosis
- Symptoms not being caused by a medical condition

HIV/Harm Reduction and Needle Exchange Program – Tatiana Dierwechter
Chris Gray, Benton County Outreach Harm Reduction Specialist was not able to attend the meeting today. Dierwechter reported that Gray has been providing outreach harm reduction services in Benton County for over 12 years. Approximately 37 hours a week of his day he is out in the community on his bike building relationships with individuals who may never walk into a medical building. He carries with him outreach materials, clean syringes, and offers rapid HIV tests, syphilis test, and hepatitis C screening.

Approximately 7 years ago funding went away for this program when there was a shift from the state to only fund HIV programs for the counties with the highest HIV prevalence. Fortunately the Benton County Commissioners have seen the need for this program and have continued to support this program without the state funding since loss of funding.

### Needle Exchange

There still is a federal ban on using any funding from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and Prevention for local syringe exchange programs. Benton County has continued to fund this program with general revenue funds. Used needles are exchanged for clean needles to help decrease the sharing of needles which prevents the transmission of diseases/infections. The syringe exchange program helps promote the use of clean needles and provides a safe and appropriate disposal of used needles. There is a drop box located at the Benton County Health Department for used needles.

## **HIV Early Intervention**

This year, the state of Oregon was able to secure funding from the CDC for early HIV intervention. Benton County joined partnerships for a Regional HIV Early Intervention and Outreach Program with Linn County, Lincoln County and the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians. The joint grant application was submitted and funded. Funding is for 5 years and will allow expansion of what currently Gray does in Benton County to all three counties and the tribe. Testing, prevention, education, and outreach services will be provided to individuals in the region who are at risk for HIV and other sexually transmitted infections. A full time Outreach Harm Reduction Specialist will be hired for Linn County with direct supervision done by Benton County. Lincoln County and the Tribe have hired their full time position.

Pre Exposure Prophylactic (PrEP) is an oral medication that is prescribed to someone who is at high risk for HIV. When taken consistently and guidelines followed, PrEP is almost 100% effective in preventing HIV. A recent survey of local providers identify a limited understanding and prescribing of PrEP; outreach and raising awareness of PrEP is currently happening for clinical providers.

Dierwechter suggested if the committee would like data for the Needle Exchange/Harm Reduction program that Gray can attend an upcoming MHADDAC meeting.

### I. Call to Order and Introductions

Meeting called to order at 5:15 pm by Amy Young, Chair. Introductions were made.

## II. Approval of April 2018

The April 2018 minutes were presented for approval.

#### III. New Business

Updates, Discussion, Questions, and Answers - Senator Gelser

Gelser provided updates to the committee.

The Oregon Health Authority has hired a new director. This person is a great system leader; however, she was unsure of background in mental and behavioral health. It will be important to reach out to Anderson and the other Mental Health Directors when discussions happen around mental and behavioral health.

There is also a new state hospital director. This person comes from a different state that has a different philosophy than Oregon. For instance, the implementation of armed police at their state hospital campus and established that those who are considered dangerous or not behaving well be put into isolation for up to 2 weeks. Gelser has shared her concern with the new director. Oregon should never be a state with armed police at the state hospital, as this should be a place of healing.

There has been confusion at the local and state level regarding agency responsibility for dually diagnosed children that are experiencing intellectual disabilities and mental illness whose family goes into crisis. Workgroups were formed to address the issue and bring forward recommendations; however, it was noted that nobody from the developmental disabilities community was included in the workgroup. The oversight was addressed.

Peterson stated that the Residential Ombudsman program has been receiving an increase in calls and complaints from across the state about KEPRO. This is the organization that the Oregon Health Authority hired to do the authorizations for residential care. When trying to reach out to KEPRO, they have not been forthcoming. There is some instability where people are being moved out, not receiving a 30 day notice. Instead they get a level of care redetermination which makes them ineligible for services for residential or foster homes. There have been some occurrences where people have been dropped off at their local county mental health office on a Friday afternoon since there is no longer any payment option for them. It has also been reported that there are some residential providers who have not been paid for services for over year. Senator Gelser took notes on this issue.

Discussion with Senator Gelser was held at length.

Overall class morale and spirit of the classroom will be covered.

Benton County Mental Health Housing Update – Kenny Lowe, Housing Coordinator Lowe is in attendance today per request of the committee to provide an update on the Housing program since last year. T

Lowe explained that here is a lot of advocacy work that is done to help individuals get into the homes. There are a limited number of home owners in the community who are willing to rent out properties to individuals with criminal history in addition to severe and persistent mental illness, even though there is oversight of individuals in this program. Positives for home owners who rent to these individuals include secured timely monthly payment and ensuring rules are being followed.

The law enforcement rental assistance program criteria is for those with criminal history barriers and who have severe and persistent mental illness and are being discharged from a facilities or referred from parole and probation. Successful in filling 12 spots in less than a

year. As of today, 5-7 of those individuals have transition into the permanent Section VIII Housing program.

Lowe shared a few stories of how the housing program has helped individuals be successful.
