## What is a CHIP?

Benton County Public Health organizes its health improvement work around a Community Health Improvement Plan.

### A Community Health Improvement Plan is:

- Organized around priority areas that focus on improving the health of our whole community, with special attention on issues of equity.
- A set of specific goals, strategies, and measurable data that guides the work of our health department, our partners, and our community.
- Developed by our community, based on an assessment of our community's health, and guided by our common values.
- A living document that is renewed on a five-year cycle.
- Known as a CHIP for short.
