
Goals of Presentation

What is a Regional Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP)?

- A plan that outlines priorities, goals, and strategies designed to guide organizations and individuals in Linn, Benton, and Lincoln counties.
- Actions to improve the health of our entire community, with a focus on equity.
- Developed with data, community values and voices.
- A living document that gets renewed on a three-year cycle.

CHIP Development Process




What informs the CHIP?

Regional Health Assessment Data for health factors and outcomes in Linn, Benton, and Lincoln counties, analyzed and compared to the state of Oregon.

Key Informant Interviews with a diverse set of community-based and cultural organizations, decision-makers, and others. (31 Interviews)

Community Health Survey of people who live, work, learn and play in Linn, Benton and Lincoln counties. (2,000 responses)

Focus Groups with diverse community members and partner organizations. (11 focus groups)



Our Commitment to Equity

- We believe that every individual in the community is valuable, and we strive to create equitable opportunities and access to resources for everyone.
- We acknowledge that certain groups of people face more barriers to good health than others, and we need to put in extra effort to ensure (make sure) that everyone can achieve their best health.

Limitations

- The data within this report is from 2019-2022. Disparities surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic may be under represented.
- Available sources of available information may limit data collection and representation.
- Language and information used come directly from sources that may not account for individuals' unique circumstances and experiences.

Key Health Themes - What are these?

- Key Health Themes are disparities, challenges, or opportunities that have emerged through an analysis of community voices and primary/secondary data from the RHA data report.
- Sources include primary, secondary, qualitative, and quantitative data from the RHA and community voices



Access to Affordable Housing/Homelessness

Access to safe, quality, and affordable housing is necessary for healthy living.

The percent of K-12 students experiencing homelessness* in Lincoln County was **3 times higher** than the state in 2019-2020.



The Linn, Benton, and Lincoln (LBL) region had about **870 people experience homelessness** in 2019.

*Homeless in terms of youth is defined as lack of a fixed place of residence or a supervising parent or guardian.

Access to Affordable Housing/Homelessness



Half of rented households in our region were experiencing a housing burden* in 2020.





A quarter of owned households in our region were experiencing a housing burden* in 2020.

*Housing burden is defined as paying more than 30% of household income on rent or mortgage, insurance, and utilities.

Access to Quality Care

An adequate healthcare workforce is necessary for increasing access to care, improving patient experiences, and controlling service costs.






Dentists per 10,000 individuals

Lincoln and Linn Counties had lower rates of **primary care physicians** than Oregon in 2020.


Our region had lower rates of **dentists** than Oregon in 2020.

Health insurance helps people afford medical care in an emergency or when seeking preventative care.




Percentage of Individuals without Health Insurance

Lincoln County had a higher percentage of individuals who did not have health insurance coverage in 2021.

Our region is racially/ethnically less diverse than the state of Oregon.




Percentage of individuals living in poverty



Lincoln and Linn County percentages of people living in poverty with a disability were higher than the state in 2021. **1 in 9** individuals in our region **spoke another language** at home in 2020.


Equity, Diversity & Inclusion

Food Insecurity/Access

Access to healthy affordable food is important predictor of health.



1 in 10 individuals in Benton County utilized **SNAP benefits**. 1 in 5 utilized them in Lincoln County, Linn County, and the state in 2020.




Our region experienced higher rates of **food insecurity** (1 in 8 individuals) than the state in 2020.


Food Insecurity/Access

Limited transportation options and distance to grocery stores reduce access to nutritious food.

Individuals who live within 1/2 mile to a grocery store



Only 3.5 out of 10 individuals were within ½ mile to a grocery store in 2019 Linn County





Only 2 out of 10 individuals were within ½ mile to a grocery store in 2019

Healthy Youth & Families

Includes prenatal health, youth of all ages, and access to education





Prenatal tobacco use averages

1 of every 6 pregnancies in Lincoln and Linn Counties.

Prenatal tobacco use averages **1 of every 10** pregnancies in Benton County.

Prenatal tobacco use among those 18–19-years old is higher in our region than in Oregon, in 2011-2020.

Healthy Youth & Families

Teen pregnancy and childbearing have long-term social and economic costs on teen parents and their children.




Teen pregnancy rates per 1,000

Lincoln and Linn Counties had higher teen (15-19 years old) pregnancy rates per 1,000 than Benton or the state in 2020.

Childhood and adolescence set the stage for later health and well-being




Lincoln County Oregon


Our region had higher rates of child abuse victims per 1,000 than Oregon in 2021.

Lincoln County had almost twice as many children in foster care per 1,000 as Oregon did in 2021.

Mental Health

Mental health has a significant impact on overall health and is influenced by of emotional, psychological, and social factors.





Over 1 in 5 residents in our region were **diagnosed with depression** in 2020.

The **suicide rate** in Lincoln County was **double** that of Linn and Benton Counties in 2020.


Within the age group of 10-44, the **rate of completed suicide** in Lincoln County was **twice as high** compared to Benton County, Linn County, and the state in 2017-2020.

Mental Health

In Lincoln County, higher rates of 8th graders reported attempting suicide than in the other two counties and the state in 2019.




A third of 8th graders in Lincoln County report being bullied. This is higher than Oregon in 2019.




Two out of five 11th graders in our region felt **sad or hopeless** almost every day for two weeks in a row in 2019.

Substance Use and Misuse

In our region, the percent of **11th graders** who report misusing **prescription drugs** is **higher** than the state in 2019.






11th graders report using **alcohol** in the LBL region in 2019. **1 out of 4** eleventh graders report using **E-Cigarettes** in our region in 2019.

Substance Use and Misuse

Drug overdose deaths in the tri-county region were driven by opioids and methamphetamine.



Drug Overdose Death Count

The Linn County drug overdose death count is twice that of Benton County in 2019
